By The Plumb

I've written already about the Plumb and the Level. The last of the officers' jewels to consider is the Square, the jewel of the Worshipful Master. This one symbol is most typical of Freemasonry as a whole.

If asked to name one Masonic emblem, Mason and non-Mason alike, nine times out of ten, will probably answer, "The Square!" Many learned writers on Freemasonry have nominated the Square as the most important and vital, most typical and common symbol of the ancient Craft.

Masonically the word "square" has the same three meanings given by the world:

- (1) The conception of right-angled-ness - our ritual tells us that the square is an angle of ninety degrees, or the fourth part of a circle;
- (2) The builder's tool, one of our working tools, the Master's own immovable jewel;
- (3) That quality of character which has made "a square man" synonymous not only with a member of our Fraternity, but with uprightness, honesty and dependability.

The first of the three meanings must have been the mathematical conception and we should reflect upon the wisdom and reasoning powers of men who lived five thousand years ago, that

they knew the principles of geometry by which a square can be constructed.

The square is the symbol of regulated life and actions. It is the Masonic rule for correcting and harmonizing conduct on principles or morality and virtue, and as a symbol, it is dedicated to the Master. We also identify ourselves with this symbol, because we are taught that squares, levels and perpendiculars are the proper signs to know a mason.

We are surrounded by squares in our Lodge. It stands, as one of the Great Lights, in the centre of all our activities. It is repeated in our Fellow Craft salute, our feet positions, our way of moving around the Lodge and our legs when at the altar in our Fellow Craft obligation.

In the construction trade, the square is used for "trueing" stones and "proving" them correct. We can see how easily, the association with truth and virtue could arise. There was the historical belief that the shape of the ancient world was an oblong square and this is represented in our

"squared Lodge."

There have been references to the square's meaning as a symbol long before the start of Masonry, as we know it. The Egyptians, Confucius and Aristotle refer to "square actions" and associate this with honest dealings, high morality, and virtue. The symbol is not original, it is certainly far from new, but it seems to have a remarkable consistency of meaning.

Always remember that as Masons and men of character we are always to square our actions by the square of virtue.

There are a few more inspections coming up this month. I continue to

The Great Pythagoras

One of the most celebrated of the Grecian philosophers, and the founder of what has been called the Italic School, was born at Samos in the period of 586-69 B.C., the year 582 being favored as the probable one of his birth. Educated as an athlete, he subsequently abandoned that profession and devoted himself to the study of philosophy. He traveled through Egypt, Chaldea, and Asia Minor, and is

said to have submitted to the initiations in those countries for the purpose of acquiring knowledge. On his return to Europe, he established his celebrated school at Crotona, a Dorian Colony in the south of Italy, about 529 B.C., much resembling that subsequently adopted by the Freemasons. His school soon acquired such a reputation that disciples flocked to him from all parts of Greece

and Italy. Pythagoras taught as the principal dogma of his philosophy the system of metempsychosis, or the transmigration of souls. He taught the mystical power of numbers, and much of the symbolism on that subject which we now passes is derived from what has been left to us by his disciples, for of his own writings there is nothing extant.

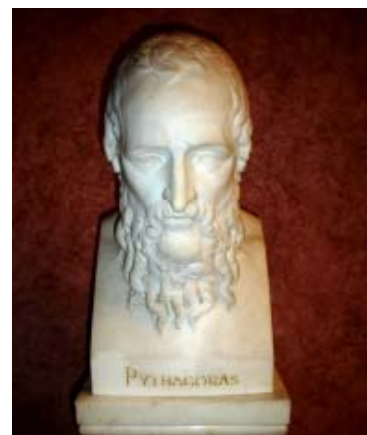

He was also a geometrician, and is regarded as having been the inventor of several problems, the most important of which is that now known as the forty-seventh problem of Euclid. He was also a proficient in music, and is said to have demonstrated the mathematical relations of musical intervals, and to have invented a number of musical instruments. Disdaining the vanity and dogmatism of the ancient sages, he contented himself with proclaiming that he was simply a seeker after knowledge, not its possessor, and to him is attributed the introduction of the word

philosopher, or lover of wisdom, as the only title which he would assume. After the lawless destruction of his school at Crotona, he fled to the Locrians, who refused to receive him, when he repaired to Metapontum, and sought an asylum from his enemies in the temple of the Muses, where tradition says that he died of starvation at near the end of the sixth or the beginning of the fifth century. Some claim the date to be 506 B.C., when he was about seventy-six years old.
